

The Style Guide of the Journal of Political Risk

The *Journal of Political Risk* uses the Chicago Manual of Style (CMS). A brief selection of the most frequent points of confusion with the CMS are provided below. Please consult the CMS online at www.chicagomanualofstyle.org for more thorough guidelines.

Section I – Numbers

• All numbers between 1-99, should be written out. All numbers greater than or equal to 100, should be given as Arabic numerals.

Examples: There protest lasted for ninety-five days.

More than 100,000,000 people lived in the city.

• Large monetary values should be given in the following form:

\$100 million \$50 billion

Section II - Citations

- The *Journal of Political Risk* does not use footnote citations. Please convert all footnotes to endnote citations.
- All endnote citations should be referenced using Arabic numerals.

Example: The cost of the plane was \$1 million.¹

• All citations should be placed at the end of a clause or sentence.

Example: According to the BBC, Thai officials²-rejected the proposal.

According to the BBC, Thai officials rejected the proposal.²

Section III - Punctuation

 Quotation marks should always be placed after periods, question marks, or commas.

Example: The Defense Ministry noted that the sale of the equipment was "nearing

completion."
